Dr. Hutt was a Superior Court Judge in Arizona for 17 years. She has facilitated alternative dispute resolution in hundreds of cases, a number of them environmental cases. She has facilitated dispute resolution of NAGPRA-protected items between tribes and museums across the country.

She was a fellow in Museum Studies at the Smithsonian Institution, received the Department of Interior Conservation Service Award for cultural property education, and has been honored by the Society of Professional Archaeologists. She was a trustee of the Heard Museum in Phoenix, AZ.

Dr. Hutt has taught resource protection for the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, Glynco, GA, and for the Department of Justice. She teaches cultural property management for the Departments of Agriculture, Defense, Energy, and Interior and has given seminars for tribes, museums, and states. She has been a lecturer and visiting law professor at American University, Arizona State University, George Washington School of Law, Southwestern School of Law, Suffolk University, and the University of Arizona. She has taught cultural property law in graduate programs at the University of Nevada, Reno and George Mason University, and also has given seminars in cultural resource management for the National Preservation Institute.

Dr. Hutt has published numerous articles on cultural property issues and three books: *Archeological Resource Protection* (Wiley, 1992), *Heritage Resources Law* (Wiley, 1999), and *Cultural Property Law: A Practitioner's Guide* (American Bar Association, 2004), and is the editor of the *Yearbook of Cultural Property Law* (Left Coast Press, series inaugurated 2006).
